## RESOLUTION (082-2017) LAW ENFORCEMENT AGREEMENT - SHERIFF/INDIAN VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT

## AGREEMENT FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

This Agreement is made and entered into by and between the Indian Valley School District, Tuscarawas County, Ohio, hereinafter referred to as the "District" and the Tuscarawas County Sheriff and Board of Commissioners, Tuscarawas County, Ohio, hereinafter referred to as "Tuscarawas County."

The purpose of this Agreement is to provide law enforcement services to the District.

The Agreement is as follows:

- Tuscarawas County will provide law enforcement services to the District when school
  is in session.
- 2. The District will pay \$17.00 per hour. The District will only be billed for hours of service performed. This billing shall be made by the Tuscarawas County Sheriff's Office to the District on the first day of the month, commencing with the first day of the month following the execution of this agreement. All billings received by the District are to be paid within thirty (30) days of receipt.
- Service will be performed on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays on days students are in session until the end of the 2016-2017 school year or upon prior cancellation as described in item 5 below.
- All deputies to be used for this contract shall have full arrest powers and authority to arrest as needed.
- This agreement will commence January 19, 2017 and will be month-to-month until canceled upon thirty (30) days written notice from either party.

**Discussion:** Tim Ross, District Director, Office of Congressman Bob Gibbs, was present to touch base with the commissioners in his district, especially those that are new. Mr. Ross congratulated Commissioner Sciarretti and appreciates his willingness to serve. Congressman Gibbs has been very active this year. Areas of main concern includes healthcare costs rising, long term capital funding and infrastructure funding. The President has indicated a willingness to look at funding infrastructure but there are no plans yet. Mr. Ross is happy to be of service anyway he can. He acknowledged Jennifer Kiko's (Field Representative, Congressman Gibbs' Office) involvement in Tuscarawas County and send her regrets that she could not attend the meeting today. Commissioner Abbuhl mentioned one of the major projects for Tuscarawas County is the 911 System upgrade if there are any grants or funding available he would be interested.

**Discussion:** Larry Lindberg, County Auditor presented and reviewed the following communication regarding the "financial health" of the County:

#### Commissioners:

The Auditor of State recently completed reviews of 'financial health' for all counties in Ohio based upon the annual financial statements of the counties. The purpose was to identify early signs of fiscal stress in the counties.

The State Auditor identified 17 different indicators for review. I am pleased that Tuscarawas County received positive (most favorable) ratings in 16 of the 17 indicators. We received no critical (most serious) ratings in any category. No one indicator should be considered a sign of financial distress.

I believe the favorable ratings reflect positively the County's financial condition and that County officials are prudently managing finances based upon available resources. In recent years, the County has had a severe loss of revenues through the elimination of Personal Property Taxes and Commercial Activity Taxes. We have also seen a substantial reduction in Earnings on Investments and Local Government shared revenues. Even with these reductions, we continue to provide required and needed services to residents through existing resources. Tuscarawas County operates through property and sales taxes which are among the lowest in the State.

The one area rated as 'cautionary' is related to the accumulated depreciation on capital assets being above 50% of the total value of the assets. The State Auditor has established a cautionary rating for any calculation between 50 and 70 percent. Tuscarawas County was calculated at between 52 and 58 percent during the 5 year period reviewed. This is far below the critical threshold established at 70 percent. The state's description of this condition indicates that the county "may be delaying replacement of capital assets or significant repairs for cash flow purposes". I believe that analysis applies to our situation. With cuts in various revenues in recent years, I do not believe we have been able to replace assets as often as we would like. We are also using a useful life (years) for assets as determined during an asset valuation conducted in 2007. If we find we are constantly using assets beyond their useful life estimates, we should review these expectancies to determine if they should be increased which would result in less depreciation. Operating our capital assets until they are no longer usable seems to be safeguarding taxpayer monies, but without monitoring, we could find ourselves faced with large capital outlay disbursements in the future. In reviewing this information in greater detail, we have determined that the classification of "vehicles" has the largest depreciation percent at 66.8%. The classification of Buildings and Improvements has the best depreciation percent at 44.9%. Tuscarawas County Commissioners should continue to fund replacement of capital assets as available resources permit.

In reviewing the report of all counties in Ohio, only 58 counties were able to be rated in all 17 categories. The other 30 counties were not rated in 1 or more categories mostly due to not reporting on a GAAP basis. Of the 58 rated in all categories 12 had all positive ratings and 46 had non-positive ratings. 33 counties in Ohio had a non-positive rating in the Capital Asset category as we did. No county in this immediate area had all positive ratings.

Overall, I believe the report reflects favorably on the financial condition of County Government. I look forward to future years Financial Health Indicators to assist in identifying early signs of fiscal stress.

Mr. Lindberg stated this report shows that county officials are doing a good job managing the finances and resources and continue to provide the required and needed services of the county primarily through the property tax and sales tax that are among the lowest in State. He reiterated the County received Positive Outlook on 16 of the 17 categories with the only cautionary category received was in the condition of Capital Assets with the largest depreciation being vehicles at 66.8% with the best being building and improvements at 44.9%. The Commissioners have addressed many capital project such as roof, HVAC, boilers, cruisers and looking at the courthouse dome project going out for proposal this year. The county tries to extend the life of assets to get the full use out of them and will keep vehicles more than 7 years if they are still useful.

Commissioner Abbuhl congratulated Mr. Lindberg on receiving the "Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting" for the Comprehensive Annual Report. This is the highest form of recognition and confirmation of transparency by completing this report. This is a reflection of the Auditor and staff's ability and attention to detail. Mr. Lindberg appreciates the Commissioners continued support and noted this is the 30<sup>th</sup> year the County has reported and received this recognition.
